Learning More about the Black Experience in Nevada

On February 12, during Black History Month, the Nevada Appeal reported on an event called “Ideas on Tap” at which Dr. Jody Lykes, a hip-hop scholar and diversity professor from the University of Nevada, Reno asked, “Can we discuss the realities of Black life in America without protests?” This seems like a question that is relevant not only to our society at large, but to AAUW as we advocate from a non-partisan perspective, trying not to *take sides*. He talked about how “Nevada history and Black history are intertwined” and suggested we check out a research-oriented resource called OurStoryInc.com. So, I did.

Our Story, Inc. is a non-profit “that strives to seek out, collect, preserve and exhibit the contributions, heritage, and culture of people whose experiences are not well represented in Northern Nevada history.” From the “Did You Know” page of the website, I learned about how Reno resident Jeanetta Scott remembers that, in the 1950s, Black people could not walk down Virginia St. or enter any of the commercial establishments.

And how Sparks resident, Bertha Woodward, known as the *matriarch* of the Reno-Sparks Branch of the NAACP, fought for Black people to have access as customers (not just employees) to Reno’s casinos, hotels, and other businesses.

The website is a rich repository of information about what it was like to live in Northern Nevada from the perspective of its Black residents. It is also a great place to research speakers for your next Branch meeting or event. For example, maybe you’d like to hear from Dr. Angela Taylor, CEO of Guardian Quest, a Reno-based corporate consulting firm whose vision is to “ignite transformational change in minds and hearts.” Or perhaps Dr. L.



Martina Young, the first African American Director of Dance at UNR and currently a professor of Core Humanities, could share a “new” perspective on Arts & Culture with your Branch members.

I invite you to explore this wonderful website to learn more about inspiring historical and contemporary Nevadan leaders who happen to be Black women. The website, of course, also has stories from Black men, and from people from our local Indigenous communities.

For a similar repository focused on Southern Nevada, check out the “African American Experience in Las Vegas” at the UNLV library: <http://digital.library.unlv.edu/aae>. This rich resource was developed and maintained by Ms. Claytee White, who currently serves as Chair for the Oral History Research Center for UNLV. What an interesting speaker she would be! Finally, for a more specific focus on equity, you might enjoy, “The African American Civil Rights Experience in Nevada, 1900 – 1979”, a report provided in PDF format via the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office website.

P.S. I’m using the word “Black” intentionally. It is the word used by Dr. Lykes and by many of the individuals who tell their stories on the Our Story Inc. website. Color, Race, and Ethnicity are all AAUW Dimensions of Diversity. AAUW National notes that, “...some argue that colorism does more damage on an individual’s experiences and life outcomes than race — in part because race is socially constructed and often unseen, but the color of your skin is visible and indisputable and therefore has a more profound effect on our interactions.” For more information on these related yet different dimensions, you are invited to explore the AAUW DEI Toolkit’s Dimensions of Diversity page at aauw.org.

NORTHERN NEVADA DIVERSITY SUMMIT - APRIL 6, 2022

The Reno Branch submitted a proposal for UNR's April 6, 2022, Northern Nevada Diversity Summit. It was approved! For discussion, we selected the importance of the upcoming ballot on the Nevada ERA amendment to the state constitution to protect historically disenfranchised populations from injustice and disparity in society. Moderator Professor Jamie Palmer (Nevada State College) and panelists Nevada Senator Pat Spearman and Assemblywoman Jill Tolles will address the challenges of discrimination and the power to redress inequality with the basic guarantee of rights as a constitutional amendment. In Memoriam



Sharon Kirby, a long-time member of AAUW Tahoe Nevada, passed away from cancer in Portland, Oregon in November 2021. She and her husband John had moved to Portland several years ago. She is survived by her husband, her son and daughter, and four grandchildren.





As is the case with all our newsletter articles, there is so much going on that it is difficult to condense to a short summary. I will try, and am including a lot of links to additional information. The focus of our National Public Policy Meeting this month and (Washington Update) this week were:

Highlights of the State of the Union Address

Many of AAUW's policy areas were mentioned in the speech including the Paycheck Fairness Act, Violence Against Women Act, support for women in the workforce and caretaking, protecting women's right to access abortion, protecting the freedom to vote, and advancing criminal justice reform. Two notable items that went without mention were the ERA and Student Debt. While the President did not mention the ERA in the speech, we had the historic view of two women sitting behind him during the address. Student Debt remains a major issue for many of our members as recent studies show that women hold about 2/3 of the nation's student debt. Additional information: AAUW Reports:

The speech also mentioned several bi-partisan areas where they hope to move forward: the opioid crisis, mental health, support of Veteran's, and support of cancer research.

The upcoming vote on Supreme Court Nominee Ketanji Brown Jackson

Another great history making event for 2022 as Judge Jackson is the first Black Woman nominated to the Supreme Court. She is an inspiring nominee due to her wide variety of experience in private law practice, as a public defender, a Supreme Court clerkship with Stephen Breyer, a judge in the District Court for the District of Columbia from 2013-2021. During her prior confirmation to the U S Court of Appeals, District of Columbia Circuit in 2021 she had bipartisan support. AAUW [supports](#) Judge Jackson, link to the press release. From the Reno Branch:

The Reno Branch is conducting all leadership council and monthly membership meetings virtually until the end of the year. Our hope is to find an appropriate place to meet that will enable us to conduct hybrid (in-person and virtual) meetings that will satisfy the needs of our members. The Branch has five active interest groups that meet monthly—the Hiking/Walking and Bridge Groups meet in person and the Book, Great Decisions, and Mindfulness Groups enjoy meeting via Zoom.

We've had very successful and well-attended program meetings throughout the year. In January, we heard from a former Arizona police chief about the violence against women and the obstacles of overcoming gender bias in the #MeToo Era. The main takeaway was to "start by believing the victims." In February, we celebrated Black History Month by welcoming Dr. Angela Taylor (Angie) who reminded us about the challenges of growing up Black in a community where there were few. Fortunately for her, and us, many teachers and counselors recognized her talents and urged her to embrace leadership positions. She did. Angie received a PhD from UNR in Educational Leadership and was inducted into the UNR Athletic Hall of Fame and the Nevada Women's Fund Hall of Fame. She is currently president of the Washoe County School Board and has a successful training and consulting business.



From the Tahoe-Nevada Branch:

The AAUW Tahoe-Nevada Branch was excited to be able to assist our local schools these last three months. We reached out to them back in September and worked with the counselors and staff to identify where some assistance was needed. We were able to fund a Star Math Assessment tool for our middle school to help math teachers with their evaluations. We're also funding the middle school's Culinary Club with start-up equipment. This Culinary Club will be taught by one of the science teachers who will reach out monthly to a rotation of students. These students will have an opportunity to learn how to plan and cook healthy meals, while learning different cooking techniques. It will focus on creating healthy habits, build confidence, work collaboratively and use leadership skills.

We also purchased a 3D printer for the elementary school's Maker Space. Educators are leveraging the benefits of 3D printers. 3D modeling and printers can bring almost any educational concept to life, while building practical skills such as problem solving, creative coding and design.

In addition, we have assisted the schools with some requested rainy day board games and bringing back to life the atrium garden at the middle school. All this was made possible by our amazing Strategic Planning Committee that was formed this year to focus on community needs!

Looking forward, we plan to work with other Tahoe Region AAUW Branches in sponsoring a STEM Day this Spring. This is exciting for us as it was put on hold over the past two years. We are focused on bringing awareness to the middle school regarding the UNR Math and Engineering camps this summer, and hope to sponsor a few girls to attend.

We've had some very interesting program topics for our meetings. In February, we learned about the Truckee Warming Center and in March, our speaker spoke about Cryptocurrency. In April, we hope to tour the Thunderbird Lodge. All these activities are focused on bringing our members together to learn more about our community, our surroundings and each other.

As President of our Branch, my hope is to continue our educational efforts in the schools over the coming years. Our Scholarship process begins in April, and we plan to assist two college-bound young women over their four years of higher education.
