

#### We Know What We Are...But What Are We Not?

As members of AAUW, we know what we are – we are advocates, activists, learners, helpers, fundraisers, and leaders. We have educated and fought for gender equity for almost 150 years! We are quite clear on who we are and why we do what we do. This may be why, when we reflect on National's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) campaign, some of us bristle. Just a bit. We bristle at the idea that the way we have been doing our work for over a century is...not quite right. We feel a hint of resentment at the suggestion that our smeared and battered glasses have been rose-colored all along. After all, we have marched, lobbied, and raised our voices to create positive change. We know that we are resilient, strong, and determined.

Indeed, we are! We are, Gentle Readers, also "privileged."

(Perhaps some of you recognize Miss Manners' trademark greeting. If there is ever a time to be gentle, it is in a discussion of "privilegel" I borrow it with gratitude.)

Gentle Reader, I have learned that "privilege" is not about how much money your family had when growing up, or whether you had to work hard or go without. In the context of DEI, "privilege" is not about what mattered; it's about what didn't matter. For example, a straight, white gentleman has rarely been denied a job because he is straight, white, or a man. Mr. SWM (straight, white, man) lives his life with little thought to his sexual orientation, race, or gender – as if he has blinders on – because

none of these things mattered when he enrolled in college, applied for a job, or bought a house. His sexual orientation, race, and gender simply played no part in the success of those endeavors. One could say, Gentle Reader, that he was privileged. He was privileged to *not* be gay, Black, or a woman.

As/Is, a body-positive social media influencer group, gives this example of privilege: "Some people are born into families where they have to walk for miles to get water. I just have to turn on the faucet. That's privilege."

And so Gentle Reader, I invite you to consider what you are NOT, and how that has benefitted you – your ability to go to college, open a bank account, join a social club, live in a certain neighborhood. You may find that your lived experience is influenced as much by what you are *not* as by what you are.

Why does this matter? Because when we take off our own blinders, we see the world in a wider and deeper context. We realize that we have much to learn about the lived experience of the people who are not like us, often the people whom our AAUW activities are meant to help. Alas, Gentle Reader, our loving hearts are no longer sufficient. As "accidental activist" Franchesca Ramsey says, "It's not about intent, it's about impact." The most recent social justice movements (e.g., #metoo, Black Lives Matter, LGBTQIA+, Decolonization) are politely asking us to step to the side, to walk behind, to use our privilege to support those who are different from us, so that they can fight for their rights.

It's true, Gentle Reader! We are not being asked to eschew our privilege. Quite the contrary, we are being asked to revel in it, indulge it, to use all that we are – and all that we are *not*— to stand up and speak out for what we know is right; to be allies. Privilege, it turns out, is a powerful tool. One that we can use to share the love and co-create a more equitable and peaceful world.

#### From the Boulder City Branch:

The Boulder City Branch of AAUW is celebrating its 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year! Our Branch has more than 20 members with diverse interests and degrees from all over! Each of us has a strong commitment to assist other women to achieve their educational and life goals. Our Membership Chair, Linda Gardner, has created a great brochure with this information and much more including a membership form.

Our April 2022 Branch meeting included a presentation by Mary Ralph, the President of Emergency Aid of Boulder City. Emergency Aid provides food, rental, utility and other financial assistance to Boulder City residents. Mary provided history about Emergency Aid which originated to provide assistance to workers during the building of Hoover Dam in the 1930s. When Hoover Dam workers got injured and couldn't work, Emergency Aid provided needed help. Mary expressed appreciation of our Branch in annually donating backpacks and school supplies to Emergency Aid.

On Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>, our Wine and Chocolate Tasting Scholarship Fundraiser took place.. Thanks to all of our AAUW members, friends, and sponsors, we will be able to give 5 scholarships to students continuing their education for the Fall semester. Our Scholarship Chair, Anne Slavicek, put the word out on our website and to local media about how to apply, and will obtain help from members to serve on the Scholarship Committee to select worthy students.

Our May 2022 Branch meeting included a presentation by Dr. Christina Vela, the CEO of St. Jude's Ranch for Children. Dr. Vela shared the mission of St. Jude's: To transform the lives of abused and at-risk children, young adults and families by empowering them to create new chances, new choices and new hope in a caring community. The programs provided by St. Jude's include: Foster Care Services, Homeless Youth Services, Child Sex Trafficking Services, Support Services (Clinical Services, Educational Support, Job Training, Discharge Services, Post-Secondary Scholarship). For ages 0-18: Therapeutic Residential Program, Sibling Reunification, Pregnant & Parenting, Transitional Housing. Foe ages 18-24: Transitional Living, Rapid Re-Housing, Drop-In Center. Ages 10-24: Specialized Foster Care, Homeless Services and Healing Center (coming soon).

Our Branch also provided Book Group meetings in April and May at the home of Laura Pyzer, former President of Boulder City Branch.

#### From the Tahoe-Nevada Branch:

The AAUW Tahoe Nevada Branch had such a successful year!

We implemented a "Buddy System" for our new members to help welcome them into the Branch with a smoother transition. We had 18 new members this year.

We formed two special committees: a Financial Oversight Committee and a Strategic Planning Committee. Both worked hard to help review and define new processes for the Branch to keep us running smoothly in the future. One of our goals this year was to assist the community/schools at the lower grades to target STEM activities and interests. The Strategic Planning committee worked with the schools to understand some of their needs and the Board was able to approve \$7,300 to the schools and the community. We purchased a Math Assessment Tool, Culinary Club equipment, 3D printer, a UNR Math Camp scholarship and assisted the Dean's Future Scholars Summer program. We are implementing a grant process in order to award additional dollars to the community over the next four years.

Working with the Tahoe Basin and Carson City Branches we held a STEM TREK Day in June. We had 15 girls participate in the event and had three awesome speakers: Anna Serbinendo, an acrobatic flyer who is also studying Astronautics, and Laura Patten and Tiffany Racz who spoke on the technology used to monitor invasive species in Lake Tahoe. A big thanks goes to Meri McEneny of the North Tahoe Branch for chairing this event.

We awarded three scholarships this year, two being renewable for 3 more years to very deserving young women. Our Scholarship Committee works hard each year to identify and interview candidates.
