From the Reno Branch:

The Reno Branch DEI committee has developed a very exciting, interesting, and informative array of programs for our monthly meetings. We have had presentations on a variety of topics related to our AAUW mission by professors and experts from UNLV and UNR, as well as wonderful documentary films scheduled for viewing prior to the meetings.

The November program focused on the oppression of Indigenous populations and the slowness of change. The accompanying video, *Warrior Women*, is available for a fee at

The January program looked at the history of efforts to obtain gender equity across cultures and was preceded by the opportunity to view the documentary *She's Beautiful When She's Angry* (available on YouTube at

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=e-n829QzZ58&t=48s).

Yet to come are more exciting programs and films: one looking at academic successes for students of color and another on the implications of overturning of Roe v. Wade on women's reproductive rights and what is being done to ameliorate the situation.

The membership has shown great interest by attending and being prepared with many relevant questions and comments.

From the Tahoe-Nevada Branch:

The Tahoe Nevada Branch was very active in the second half of 2022. We began in July by celebrating our Scholarship Recipients as our Hometown Heroes in our local 4th of July parade. In August, we sent out \$15,000 in scholarship payments for the seven students we are currently supporting as they pursue their college careers at institutions across the country.

Our Scholarship Committee also started a mentoring program for the newest class of scholarship recipients; Members volunteered to be matched with the new college students to help them successfully navigate the transition from high school to the next phase of their academic career. We have found that, especially since COVID, some of the young women were having difficulty continuing with their planned academic path. Using a mentor as a sounding board and a resource to help get classes added in a timely manner and discuss career paths has been very beneficial as they begin their college journeys.

We wrapped up the month of August with a very successful Silent Auction and Garden Party fundraiser which showcased local artists on a beautiful estate on Lake Tahoe.

The highlight of our Fall was the initial offering of our new Community Education Grant Program. We were able to award over \$12,000 in grants to fund programs in all three Incline Village public schools and at the local branch of the Washoe County Library. Benefitted programs include Engineering classes at Incline High, a Culinary Club at the local middle school, a math intervention program at Incline Elementary School, and a Living Library Garden to be used during Weird Science Wednesdays at the public library. Our Community Education Grant Program will be accepting applications for another grant period this Spring, and we anticipate distributing nearly another \$8,000 to programs that advance our mission in our community.

Our monthly program meetings have covered topics such as the history of Incline Village, the Nevada Land Trust, a tour of the Thunderbird Lodge, and a Creativity Workshop.

As we look forward to 2023, we will have presentations by a local author on memoir writing, a presentation by the organization working towards forming the City of Incline Village, and a discussion with a representative from the new University of Nevada at Lake Tahoe campus. The work our Branch is able to accomplish is possible because of a dedicated leadership team, enthusiastic volunteers, and our 128 motivated Members.
