**Reproductive Rights:** AAUW supports choice in determining one's reproductive life and increased access to health care and family planning services.



# Dr. Terry Owens, Secretary

Dr. Terry Owens retired in 2018 from the Educational Testing Service (ETS). Primary duties included dissemination of company information, conducting workshops on Praxis testing, and

detailed analysis of test score data for presentation to higher education deans, state school boards, and licensing personnel. She led Hafen Elementary School in Pahrump, NV, from *Needing*

She led Hafen Elementary School in Pahrump, NV, from *Needing Improvement* to *High Achievement* within three years of being hired as principal. She was elected president of the Nye County Principals' Association and was appointed by Nevada Governor Gibbons to the Commission on Professional Standards in Education, where she served as the Commission president for two years.

She implemented and managed the Nevada Education Reform Act (NERA) for six years with a starting budget of \$3 million and 26 schools, and an ending budget in final two years of \$5.75 million, and 80 schools; was

appointed to a four-state consortium on school improvement hosted by WestEd in San Francisco, and as representative for the southern region school districts in the state's Professional Development Programs.

Dr. Owens was awarded *Nevada Administrator of the Year*, 2009, by the Nevada Association of School Boards and received a *Distinguished Teacher Award* from the Washoe County Teachers Association.

She was elected as State Vice President for Delta Kappa Gamma, selected as State Research Chair, and was appointed the Nevada representative to the National Legislative Forum in Washington, DC. Dr. Owens' educational background includes a Ph.D. in 2000 from the University of Nevada, Reno, in Educational Administration, an M.Ed., and a B.A. from Western State College of Colorado.

Dr. Owens is single/divorced with two sons – one living in Washington State and the other in Reno, Nevada. Current associations and activities are AAUW (Reno Branch and State Council); Reno Toastmasters, Sierra Nevada Mini Cooper Club, Northern Nevada Mensa, season ticket holder for the Reno Philharmonic, and editing novels for a local Emmy award winning journalist.

Dr. Evelyn Thompson-Hilbert, DPP (she, her, hers) has been a dedicated member of the Las Vegas AAUW for three years.
